CELEBRATING BAPTISM IN COMMUNITY

Baptism is the sacrament that gives us entrance into the community of faith and is, along with Confirmation and First Eucharist, a Sacrament of Initiation. All sacraments are communal and contribute to building our relationship with the Lord. Because of the intimate nature of the sacraments of initiation, it is a real witness from and for the community of faith when both Baptism and Confirmation are celebrated within the midst of the Sunday Eucharist. Eucharist is the source and summit of our lives as Catholic Christians. It is from the table of the Word and the table of the Eucharist that we are sent forth to continue the work of Jesus in our lives. When we nurture the baptism of our infants, we are surrounding them with the prayers and good witness of our whole community. Along with each member of the community, we welcome new life into our midst and remember our own baptismal promises. We are fortunate here at St. Anselm parish'; we are able to celebrate Baptism within the Sunday Eucharist. Let us rejoice and be glad!

Realizing the Vision



Near the end of Acts, Luke tells of Paul defending himself and his ministry before Agrippa. When Festus, the procurator who was present at the hearing, accused him of being mad, Paul argued that he was speaking

words of truth and reason. He also claimed that all those present were well aware of Jesus and all that he had done while among them. "This was not done in a corner!" declared Paul. Paul guoted this Greek proverb in order to affirm that the story of Jesus and the entire history of Christianity were public knowledge and could not be dismissed as a fiction contrived by his disciples. Luke had a similar intention when he introduced John the Baptizer, who would introduce Jesus. By naming the civil and religious authorities who held office at that time, the evangelist situated the ministries of John and Jesus squarely in the midst of human history. Our salvation was not accomplished in a corner, nor was the good news invented by a small group of misguided messianic dreamers. God's intervention in Jesus was a real, purposeful event that has forever transformed all that was, all that is, and all that ever will be. Having established the significance

of John and Jesus, Luke went on to describe the Baptizer's ministry in a manner similar to his Marcan source, in terms borrowed from Isaiah's Book of Comfort. When they were first spoken, these words assured the prophet's exiled contemporaries that God knew their plight and would create for them a new exodus and a return to their homeland. When John and the other Gospel writers quoted these words in their Gospels, they assured those who lived under Roman oppression that God had not forgotten them and would soon send relief in the person of the messiah. To prepare for his appearance, believers were called to repent and reform. As these words are spoken again in our hearing, the call to repentance is renewed. Because the One we await is the source of all goodness, justice, peace and truth, our Advent preparedness will require that we straighten out what has grown crooked in our lives, fill in the gaps created by our selfishness and descend from the heights where our pride and arrogance have led us. When he recommended similar actions to his readers through John, the Lucan evangelist departed from his Marcan source in one small but significant detail. In quoting from Deutero-Isaiah, Luke chose to include an extra line from the sixth-century prophet's vision: "and all flesh shall see the salvation of God" (v. 6; see Isa 40:5). This is announced at the outset of the public ministries of John and Jesus, and a universal tone will be heard throughout the Lucan Gospel as well as the Acts of the Apostles. That same tone should continue to reverberate in all that the church undertakes in Jesus' name. He is Savior not only for Jews and Christians but for all people. Until all humanity sees the salvation of God and experiences its blessing through our witness and our efforts, then our work here is not done. In the spirit of Advent, let us clothe ourselves in hope and faith and press on together until the vision is realized and the Lord is come.
