# CALLED TO DISCIPLESHIP



Jesus' words on loving our enemies are found in both Luke's Sermon on the Plain and Matthew's Sermon on the Mount. This week's Gospel continues Luke's Sermon on the Plain that began last Sunday. It is certainly one of Jesus' more challenging and visionary teachings

and is actually relevant to everyday life, since we can interact with our enemies often. We are told to act lovingly towards those who antagonize us, perhaps in the hope that after repeated acts of love they will cease to be our enemies. It is hard to accept Jesus' teaching on love of enemies – we are much better at loving our friends. Yet the author of John tells us in no uncertain terms:

- "I give you a new commandment, that you love one another.
- Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another.

By this everyone will know that you are my disciples if you have love for one another."

Jesus issues us a challenge that does not put boundaries on loving each other. For Jesus, mutual

love identifies his disciples. We are called to love each other following the self-giving example of Jesus himself. Non-violence sits at the heart of Jesus' teaching. There can be no doubt that both Matthew and Luke understood it that way. Matthew, in his presentation of Jesus' teaching in the Sermon on the Mount, places the sayings about nonviolence and love of enemies as the climactic elements of the famous Beatitudes of Chapter Five. In his much shorter version of that sermon, Luke gives love of enemies an even higher profile; he places the mandates of enemy love and nonviolence immediately after the Beatitudes and Woes. Six verses later, Luke rounds off that passage by repeating the mandate. When Jesus of Nazareth commands nonviolence and love of enemies, he urges nothing less than the imitation of God. "...you will be children of the Most High, for he is kind to the ungrateful and the wicked." (Luke). But I say to you, love your enemies that you may be children of your heavenly Father, for he makes his sun rise on the bad and good, and causes rain to fall on the just and the unjust." (Matthew). In other words, be as inclusive in your benevolence as the Creator. Matthew summarizes this attitude as a matter of perfection—"Be perfect just as your heavenly Father is perfect." Luke records the more appealing version of the saying: "Be merciful just as your Father is merciful." We are mandated to extend that mercy to all. Christian love of enemies, and consequent nonviolence, is not something we do simply by willing it; it springs from a relationship with God and the covenant community. Make no mistake: if we are disciples, we are called to love and non-violence. Mercy is a way of life. Questions to ponder: Both Matthew and Luke present the inaugural teaching of Jesus, making nonviolence and love of enemies central to that teaching. Can we imagine a world where non-violence and love are a way of life? Is it possible for Christians to truly follow this central teaching of our faith and actually witness to the teachings of Christ in our everyday lives? The questions are pertinent for us today. We are still struggling to implement this mandate to love our enemies. In just a few short weeks we will enter into the period of Lent. Is it possible that we might look at ways to incorporate these teachings into our everyday lives? Is it time for us to move away from the childish giving up of chocolates and wine and move into giving up gossip and intolerance - to begin the journey to truly follow Jesus' example? Would someone looking at us recognize that we are followers of Jesus by the love we show to one another? Once again, we have a chance to make changes in our lives. Are you ready? Let's go.
