St. Anselm's Ecology Group Encyclical Letter of the Holy Father Francis Laudato Si' Chapter One What is Happening to Our Common Home? V. Global Inequality

50. Instead of resolving the problems of the poor and thinking of how the world can be different, some can only propose a reduction in the birth rate. At times, developing countries face forms of international pressure which make economic assistance contingent on certain policies of "reproductive health." Yet "while it is true that an unequal distribution of the population and of available resources creates obstacles to development and a sustainable use of the environment, it must nonetheless be recognized that demographic growth is fully compatible with an integral and shared development." To blame population growth instead of extreme and selective consumerism on the part of some, is one way of refusing to face the issues. It is an attempt to legitimize the present model of distribution, where a minority believes that it has the right to consume in a way which can never be universalized, since the planet could not even contain the waste products of such consumption. Besides, we know that approximately a third of all food produced is discarded, and "whenever food is thrown out it is as if it were stolen from the table of the poor." Still, attention needs to be paid to imbalances in population density, on both national and global levels, since a rise in consumption would lead to complex regional situations, as a result of the interplay between problems linked to environmental pollution, transport, waste treatment, loss of resources and quality of life. **Pope Francis**

Yearning to Belong "No one will snatch them out of my hand."



Everyone has a story. Where has your need to belong taken you? Has your search left you peaceful or discontented? Only God understands the yearnings of your heart. Only God can match your deep longing for him with an even deeper

longing for you. In today's Gospel, Jesus tells us

just how much he yearns for each one of us. Sit with Jesus, the Good Shepherd, and hear him call your name. Journey within and listen to his soothing voice tell you that you already belong: "My sheep hear my voice. I know them and they follow me. I give them eternal life and they will never perish. No one will snatch them out of my hand" (10:27-28). Find your innermost place. There you will recognize the unique cadence and texture of God's way of speaking to you and calling your name.

The first way into that place in your heart is through the door of your natural gifts. Listen to what your true friends say about you. Which gifts do they most often mention? These gifts express your essence, the "who" of you that cannot be taken away or lost.

The second way to your innermost place is the door of your childhood dreams. When you were young and innocent, what did you dream of becoming — a baker, a teacher, a doctor, a sailor? Childhood dreams contain the first echo of the voice of God. Uncover your dreams. Enflesh them. Dare to live them. They will connect you to God and to other people.

Third, find your identity in your experience of need. In times of trial and sorrow, where do you draw strength? When all else seems lost, what keeps you together? Is it your humour, your determination, your grace or your adaptability? Facing adversity is the work of the innermost heart and it reveals us to ourselves. We do this work in the place where the voice of God is calling us by name. God is Creator. God fashions you from your desires, the multicolored threads of your strengths and weaknesses, hopes and fears, and from these weaves your existence. By exploring your gifts, your dreams, your suffering and failures, you will find yourself and uncover God within you. The challenge is that we human beings have such a terrifying need to belong that we often panic and self-destruct. The good news is that you belong to Jesus, the Good Shepherd. In him you will find your way home. All you have to do is listen to the voice of God already present within you.

For all who have shepherded us, especially parents, pastors, teachers, and mentors, that God may continue to work through them with love and strength...Lord, hear our prayer...
