St. Anselm's Ecology Group Encyclical Letter of the Holy Father Francis Laudato Si'

Chapter One
What is Happening to Our Common Home?
V. Global Inequality

52. The foreign debt of poor countries has become a way of controlling them, yet this is not the case where ecological debt is concerned. In different ways, developing countries, where the most important reserves of the biosphere are found, continue to fuel the development of richer countries at the cost of their own present and future. The land of the southern poor is rich and mostly unpolluted, yet access to ownership of goods and resources for meeting vital needs is inhibited by a system of commercial relations and ownership which is structurally perverse. developed countries ought to help pay this debt by significantly limiting their consumption of nonrenewable energy and by assisting poorer countries to support policies and programs of sustainable development. The poorest areas and countries are less capable of adopting new models for reducing environmental impact because they lack the wherewithal to develop the necessary processes and

to cover their costs. We must continue to be aware that, regarding climate change, there are differentiated responsibilities. As the United States bishops have said, greater attention must be given to "the needs of the poor, the weak, and the vulnerable, in a debate often dominated by more powerful interests." We need to strengthen the conviction that we are one single human family. There are no frontiers or barriers, political or social, behind which we can hide, still less is there room for the globalization of indifference.

THE GIFT OF PEACE



In today's gospel, Jesus is talking with his disciples the night before his death. This is his going away conversation. Jesus is aware of all that can happen, and that the Father sees it and will bring good out of it. Jesus has taught the disciples what they need for now. Down the road the "Advocate," the Holy Spirit, will bring into clarity all

that they have experienced together and all that he has taught them. They will mourn his passing, but they will find new life in the message he has given them. The Spirit will grow in them.

Today, we read this gospel as we reflect on the lives of the disciples just before Jesus departs from them at his ascension. They will again experience the loss of his companionship. They will again need their faith strengthened. They must rely on the strength of their relationship with Jesus and the presence of his Spirit in them. We are in that space ourselves today. Our relationship with Jesus, who is not physically present, must carry us. Our participation in the life of the Spirit enlightens us and lifts our lives. As a loving mentor, the Johannine Jesus is represented by the fourth evangelist as one who thought of everything, including how his followers would fend for themselves in the "little while" he would be gone from them. Indeed, they would not be alone; Jesus would bequeath to them the gifts of the Advocate or Holy Spirit, the love of God and the gift of peace. With these gifts as their inheritance, Jesus' disciples would not only survive, they would thrive.

First among the gifts of their inheritance is the love of God, dwelling with and within those who keep God's word. The Son, Jesus Christ, is the very Word of God spoken into flesh and blood, time and space, as well as every truth, every teaching, every word

spoken by Jesus while he remained with his own. Taking him as God's Word and all his words to heart introduces the believer to a new language, the language of love. Knowing and speaking and listening and pondering this new language opens the door to an intimacy with God that Jesus is willing to share. That sharing continues to grow and to deepen through the gift of the Spirit. We continue to experience the risen Lord through this same Spirit. Pervading all these gifts is the gift of peace, given in the very breath of Jesus. A traditional greeting among Jews, Peace/Shalom wishes all the best to another so that each may enjoy a life in which nothing is lacking. As they grew and developed, the Jews regarded peace as the hallmark of the messianic era. That Jesus was capable of imparting this peace to his disciples signifies that the era of the messiah and of salvation has dawned in him. For this reason, the author of Ephesians (2:14) could call upon Jesus as "Christ, our peace."

In peace and in the presence of the Paraclete, the Holy Spirit, the Advocate, the church continues to reveal the message and exercise the mission of Jesus. The life and work of Jesus is carried on in us. Once again, we approach the end of the Easter Season; once more, we are reminded of those gifts given so long ago to the first disciples. We, too, are the recipients of God's Love, the indwelling of the Holy Spirit and the Peace of Christ. To believe in the Resurrection of Jesus, we see the final end of the story, our story and the story of human history - the wonderful triumph of light, love, justice, graciousness, beauty, joyous-embrace, and God. To believe in the resurrection is to believe Julian of Norwich's wonderful dictum: And all shall be well and all shall be well and every manner of being shall be well. Amen.
