OUR WAY HOME



In our First Reading today, Ezekiel is demanding that his people adapt to the unique environment of forgiveness Yahweh has created, an environment in which they're not only permitted to change; they're invited and

expected to change. In the Gospels, Jesus creates such an environment for the "sinners" he encounters. Notice where Matthew positions today's well-known passage about the two sons: It takes place on the day after Jesus' Palm Sunday entrance into Jerusalem and his "cleansing" of the temple. It's easy to misunderstand the original significance of the temple passage. Many of us believe this visiting carpenter from Capernaum is simply condemning some greedy temple merchants for cheating people during their transactions. We could get by with that interpretation if it weren't for the quote from Jeremiah 7:11 about the "den of thieves" Jesus cites to

defend his actions. Jeremiah wasn't concerned with sixth-century B.C.E. moneychangers and animal sellers when he condemned temple worshipers for turning the temple into a "den of thieves" instead of making it a "house of prayer." In his confrontation with Jewish leaders, the prophet doesn't mean the den is the place where thieves do their thieving; it's the place where they go after their thieving in order to find security. "Here you are," the prophet declared, "trusting in deceptive words to no avail. Will you steal, murder, commit adultery, swear falsely, make offerings to Ba'al, and go after other gods that you have not known, and then come and stand before me in this house, which is called by my name, and say: 'We are safe! - only to go on doing all these abominations?' " They think their bad relations with God and other people can easily be taken care of by just visiting the temple and going through the prescribed rituals.

Like Jeremiah, Jesus perceives that for many of his fellow religious Jews, faith in Yahweh has dwindled down to a simple process of going to the temple, obtaining God's ritual forgiveness for their actions, then going out and repeating the process over and over again. For such people, Judaism has simply become a security blanket instead of being the force that drives them out to form the relationships Yahweh expects them to form. Catholic use of frequent confession without a firm purpose of amendment repeats this same delusion. It's against the background of such a misdirected faith that we hear today's story of the two sons. For Matthew's Jesus, true faith isn't about finding the religious loopholes that permit us to go on sinning; it's about creating an environment in which we and other sinners can change our life's direction. Imitating the son who originally told his father, "I will not!" but eventually thought better of it and went to work in the family vineyard, some of the tax collectors and prostitutes Jesus encounters are changing their lifestyles and "entering the kingdom of God." Unlike many of their religious contemporaries, they're taking Jesus' message seriously and are starting to discern Yahweh working effectively in their daily lives: a basic change in their faith experience. Without sensing the freeing forgiveness Jesus offered for their former way of life, such a transformation would have been unthinkable. Jesus tells his disciples, and us: "For whoever wants to save their life will lose it and whoever loses their life for my sake will find it". The parable of the two sons teaches hope. Even if we are late in realizing it, doing God's will is the way forward. It is our way home.

For the grace of conversion, that we may not merely speak of God's ways but live as faithful and dedicated disciples...**We pray**...
