FOURTH SUNDAY OF ADVENT

2 Sam 7:1-5, 8-12, 14-16 Rom 16:25-27
Ps 89 Luke 1:26-38
Forever I will sing of your Steadfast love, O Lord.

Saying Yes...



Does the Incarnation interrupt history or overtake it? Advent offers believers two different ways to wait for God. One is to focus without expectation of God's intervention; the other is to look within for a mystery

already present and only waiting for our openness to emerge more fully. The scriptures support both views. The coming of the messiah is a longawaited fulfillment of a promise made to Abraham, and repeated by the prophets, that a leader would rise from within the House of David, or that a special Servant would appear to accomplish God's plan to save his people. This heavenly figure, the Son of Man, would arrive riding on the clouds to bring justice and peace. Or, in the second view, God's Word, already present within creation as its designer and initiating source of all, was advancing within history through the long genealogy of God's covenant with his people to emerge in the fullness of time, the Son of God, Emmanuel, God-with-us. Mary, perfect model of faith, receives the already ever-present Word so completely in her mind and heart that it becomes flesh in her womb. The late theologian Edward Schillebeeckx once put forward the idea that Mary might have been reading Isaiah 7:14: "Behold, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and they shall call his name Immanuel, which means, 'God with us'" at the moment of the Annunciation. She contemplates the passage and feels the Spirit moving within her. She consents, and the Word becomes flesh. What an interesting possibility to ponder within our own hearts! Matthew names this passage as being fulfilled in the birth of Jesus (1:23). Luke has Mary say to the angel, "Let it be done to me according to your word" (1:38). As we enter into the prayer of the church in Advent, how inspiring it is to contemplate that the Word of God is also coming to us. The Incarnation is not just a one-time event but an ongoing invitation to welcome God into our lives.

As baptized members of the body of Christ, filled with the Holy Spirit and nourished by both Word and Eucharist, are we not God-bearers, temples of the Trinity, extensions of the presence of God in time and space? The scene of Mary in her house in Nazareth gives special importance to reading God's Word with faith. Where else but from his mother did Jesus learn the habit of reading the scriptures with the expectation that God's Word is always alive and becoming flesh? Thirty years later, Jesus would come home to Nazareth to stand at the lectern in the synagogue, reading from the scroll of the prophet Isaiah, "The spirit of the Lord is upon me, for the Lord has anointed me to bring Good News to the poor" (61:1). Jesus then startled his hearers by saying, "Today this passage of scripture is fulfilled in your hearing" (Luke 4:21). Standing before them was the Incarnation, the Word made flesh. Advent is our time to ponder the promise that God is among us, that the Word is asking our consent to become flesh in our lives. Mary invites us to share in the mystery she carried and bore in her human life. The church invites us to say yes to the same overshadowing of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost that gave birth to the church, extending the life and mission of Jesus in history. This is a momentous invitation, and it will change our lives forever. Christmas is our time to say yes. "Let it be done to me according to your Word."

For all believers, that we, like Mary, may ponder God's invitations to us and give our full yes to all that God asks of us...We pray...Our God will come to save us...

For a listening heart, that our hearts may be stilled and quieted so that we may hear the Word of God as it comes to us in word, event and experience each day...

We pray... Our God will come to save us...

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
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
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
