### FOURTH SUNDAY OF LENT 2 Chr 36:14-16, 19-23

Psalm 137 Eph 2:4-10 John 3:14-21 Praise to you Lord, King of Eternal Glory.

## **RICH IN MERCY AND LOVE**



In explaining himself and his mission, Jesus alludes to a very odd story from the Exodus tradition. When venomous snakes attacked the discontented people in the desert (Numbers 21),

the God who had forbidden the people to make images and who condemned Aaron's golden calf as an idol, told Moses to mold a serpent of bronze that people could look on and be healed.

The images are quite different: the calf represented a foreign god and the serpent a demonic figure. But why would God command the people to gaze on the serpent? Jewish mystics have explained looking at the serpent as looking upon evil in order to turn away from it. Gazing on the repulsive, frightening serpent was a symbol of admitting sin and seeking God's help. It's almost an anticipation of the first six of Alcoholics Anonymous' 12 steps which take people in recovery from recognizing their powerlessness to asking God to transform them.

The symbolism of this drama demonstrated that iust as Moses could fashion a model snake, so God the Creator could control death and life. The story also suggests that people can face what they most fear and not be overcome if they believe in God's life-giving power. That leads into Jesus' explanation that the Son of Man must be lifted up. But now, unlike in the time of Moses, the action of the people is not just to see and be cured, but to believe. The result will not be a return to health, but a movement to eternal life. In his commentary on the Gospel of John, biblical scholar Juan Mateos translates the word "believe" as "adhere," indicating that to believe in the Son means to hold onto or cling to him to the point of becoming one with him (El (Evangelio de Juan, Cristiandad: Madrid, 1992). Thus, believing in the Son of Man lifted up implies accepting the astonishing manifestation of Christ crucified. Believing in him confers eternal life.

Because that teaching is so dense, we can be glad that John has Jesus continue to explain. First, as opposed to an image of a punitive God, Jesus reveals God, the lover of humankind, God is not the death-dealer, but the eternal life-giver. All of Jesus' emphasis is on God's great love: the Son was sent by God to save the world. We are saved by believing in and adhering to the Son, and the result is eternal life. The Son was sent with no mission but to save. Those who choose faith in another god, those who cling to an image of divine vengeance, those who reject the light offered by Christ, condemn themselves and are left with exactly what they have chosen: They separate themselves from God by their own stubborn attitudes, and it becomes increasingly difficult to save them from themselves. In this fourth week of Lent, we are invited to remember that salvation is more than a theory, and it often has nothing to do with physical safety. We are saved by the great love of God, manifest in the one lifted up to show the way to eternal life. Those who believe in Christ lifted up are God's handiwork, saved by sharing his life and continuing his works. Today's Gospel talks about a light that penetrates into the depth of our darkness. It talks about a God who "so loved the world that he sent his only Son." It talks about a hope so glorious - eternal life with God - that it can lift the human spirit and connect it to the Source of all life. John's Gospel is all about the One sent by the Father precisely to reignite the fire of compassion within our hearts so that we can find the energy to believe again, to reembrace life, to cast out the demons of darkness. And even more than all this, the good news is: It's not about what we have to do to earn this. Instead it's all about what God gratuitously does for us. He sends his Son. He sends his Son so that we can see with our own eyes what St. Paul talks about in our second reading today when he describes our God as being "rich in mercy," when he describes you and me as being "brought to life in Christ" and when he tops it all off by calling each of us God's "handiwork."

May God give us the grace this Lent to rediscover the depths of God's love for each one of us in the hope that we can create a sense of mission in our world to overcome the pandemic that has crippled our lives and taken so many from our midst. May we hear God calling us to do all that we can to persevere in our battle to control this disease so that we may rebuild our world one step at a time.

For the Church, that we continue to grow in our relationship with Christ and manifest God's unbounded love for the human family by our deeds of light...Lord, in your mercy, hear our prayer.
