

Believe and Love



"Let us love, not in word or speech, but truth in action."(1John 3:18) With these words, the author of 1John puts his literary finger on a persistent human failing: saying one thing, such as "I love you," but doing nothing to translate words into actions. At the beginning of a friendship or a marriage, heartfelt words of love are

readily spoken, but these words fall flat and ring untrue if they are not lived out in caring and sharing, protecting and providing for the other. Evidently, the early Johannine community was suffering from a similar breach between word and deed. There were those who

took their belonging to Jesus seriously; these accepted the manner in which he had expressed his love and allowed his example to be their guide through life. There were also those who were of the mistaken notion that because they claimed to have a special knowledge of and to share a special relationship with Jesus, they were not bound by any ethical demands. To these, the Johannine writer appealed for integrity so that they who talked the talk of love would also walk the walk and do the deeds of love.

Earlier in this chapter of his letter, the Johannine writer of today's second reading, had offered his readers a definition of love: "We know love by this, that he laid down his life for us – and we ought to lay down our lives for one another" (v. 16). To further clarify his message, the ancient writer added that If someone who has worldly means sees another in need and refuses to help, how can the love of God remain in him? John was sure that it did not. Moreover, the person who succumbs to such a dichotomous lifestyle where words are not translated into works does not live in the truth.

A favoured Johannine concept, truth, has the basic meaning of non-concealment; it describes what is unveiled. Thus, as Raymond E. Brown has explained, for the Greek mind, truth and reality are closely related (The Gospel According to John, Doubleday, New York: 1966). Therefore, the Johannine pastor's call to love in truth and deed becomes all the more poignant. Make your love real, he is urging; make your good deeds known to such a degree that they become a reality for others. Believers may not only speak of their love for the needy, the hungry, the helpless and the hopeless. They must make that love truthful by doing those deeds that alleviate need. They will provide food and support, and defend and encourage those whose truth, or whose everyday reality, is lacking in all these blessings. Following through on this call to love and live in truth, the ancient writer also pointed out the means to do so — by keeping the commandments. Rather than list the several prescriptions of the Decalogue, which he presumed were very well-known to his readers, the author of 1 John summarized the commandments in two words: believe and love. Believing implies more than intellectual assent or knowledge. To believe in God is equivalent to a relationship with God, and it is that loving relationship with God that prompts the believer to love others. Through the centuries that now separate us from the first readers of this letter, much has changed, but this dual command will never change: Believe and love in truth and deed. Privileged to be called the beloved friends of Jesus, disciples throughout the ages right down to each one of us today and continuing for all time, are responsible for being faithful to Jesus at all times, recognizing that it is he who chose us and not vice versa. With that choice comes the gift of the Spirit, who enables the fidelity, service and commitment of true followers of the Christ. These virtues, when lived out on a daily basis, constitute the good fruit that Jesus, the vine, expects of his branches, his friends.

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




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
