#### Indigenous Peoples and the Church: Walking Together Toward Healing and Reconciliation

Each week, beginning on Sunday, 21 November 2021, the Solemnity of Christ the King, the CCCB will release a video recording of a Bishop in Canada reflecting on the Gospel Reading for each Sunday of Advent. This year's reflections were developed in view of the Indigenous Delegation which will be travelling to Rome to meet with Pope Francis from December 17 to 20, 2021, Each reflection is based one of the five essential stages of reconciliation: examen, confession, repentance. reparation (making amends), and reconciliation. Likewise, it is hoped these reflections will assist the faithful, Indigenous and non-Indigenous alike, in preparing for Pope Francis' eventual apostolic journey to Canada.

# Bar 5:1-9Phil 1:4-6, 8-11Ps 126Luke 3:1-6'The Lord has done great things for us;<br/>we are filled with joy.'"Prepare the way of the Lord'

Although this Lucan Gospel is proclaimed in six verses, some of us are likely to pass quickly over the initial verses and focus on the final three where the Baptizer evokes the words of the prophet

Isaiah and claims them as his job description. John's is the voice of Advent and his mission is unmistakable; he is the herald of the Savior and the precursor of the kingdom of God. But Luke has prefaced his introduction of John and his mission with information concerning the political and religious leaders of the time. The respective reigns of these leaders and the venues over which they presided were to provide Jesus with the foothold upon which he would find the leverage to move the world as it had never been moved before.

Luke's foothold has been described in terms of a specific historic time and place: the 15th year of Tiberius, that is, 28-29 C.E. Annas, who served as high priest officially from 6-15 C.E., was succeeded by his son-in-law Caiaphas, who served until 36 C.E. However, as reflected in the Gospels, most regarded Annas as the high priest until he died. In offering this detailed account, Luke was affirming the fact that Jesus and his mission made definite inroads into human history. He was not a fictional character dreamed into being in the wishful imaginations of the oppressed. Jesus was a real, flesh-and-blood figure whose presence in time and space cannot be diminished or dismissed. In his portrayal of Jesus, Luke was

anticipating the conviction that he would later place on the lips of Paul when he appeared before King Agrippa to defend his preaching of the Good News. When accused of being mad and of propagating falsehood, Paul declared that "this was not done in a corner" (Acts 26:26). The presence and power of Jesus had been openly manifested to all in real time, in real space; therefore, Jesus and the entire Christ-event could not be written off. On the contrary, the impact of Jesus was authentic, palpable, and demanded a response.

Luke's portrayal of Jesus also anticipated the mission of the church and the various political and religious arenas where the Good News would exert its influence. By referencing both Jerusalem and Rome, Luke affirmed that the disciples who would continue Jesus' mission would encounter not only the poor and the sick but also high priests, governors and emperors. They and their message would impinge upon and speak to the secular as well as the sacred realms of their day. Luke wished his readers to be certain from the outset that Jesus' mission and that of the disciples after him would be all-inclusive and universal not only in a geographic sense but also socially, politically and economically. With this affirmation of the purpose of Jesus and the disciples who continued his mission, Luke also extends a challenge to the contemporary church. In order to be true to their roots, believers in Jesus are to preach and propagate the good news until "all flesh will see the salvation of God." Through John, all of us together are challenged to make straight the paths that should lead us to God. We are urged every day — and particularly as we prepare to welcome the Lord more fully into our lives - not to be mere onlookers but to be active participants in smoothing and preparing the way that will lead us to God.

Prepare the way of the Lord. We pray... Our God will come to save us.

December 8<sup>th</sup> is the Feast of The Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary. This particular feast is misunderstood by a number of people, including many Catholics. It celebrates the teaching that Mary, the Mother of Jesus, was preserved from the effects of original sin at the moment of her conception, when the soul animated the body, and that she was further protected from sin during her lifetime so that she could be a fitting host for the incarnate Christ. On December 8, 1854, Pope Pius IX issued a public declaration entitled Ineffabilis Deus and made its teaching about Mary's sinlessness an official doctrine of the Catholic Church. Hail Mary, full of grace, the Lord is with thee. Blessed are you among women and blessed is the fruit of your womb, Jesus. Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners now and at the hour of our death. Amen.
