Are you able to host a Ukrainian family?

When hearing reports of the war in Ukraine, and the millions of Ukrainians that have been forced to flee their homeland, many have asked what they can do to help. Over 80,000 Ukrainians have already arrived to Canada through a special visa program created by Immigration Canada. An additional 500,000 have applied to the program and are expected to arrive in the coming months. Many are arriving to Toronto and are without family here in Canada to help them. Among those will be some who are vulnerable to human trafficking, particularly seniors, single women, and women with children. There is an immediate need for families to host for a period of between one and six months some of those who have arrived. Exod 17:8-13 Ps 121 2 Tim 3:14–4:2 Luke 18:1-8 Praying With Perseverance



Featured in today's sacred texts are the unforgettable characters of Moses, Timothy and the unnamed widow of the Gospel, whom God and Jesus have selected to convey the truth and the challenge of the word to us. We listen to them, and each one, in

turn, has an impact on the lives of those who welcome the lessons they teach. From Moses, we learn that no leader, however charismatic, can be self-reliant, because no leader possesses on their own the capability of leading others wisely and well. Authentic leadership, especially regarding the spiritual mentoring that all of God's people need, begins in God. To that end, Moses gave himself over to God in prayer. Through this action, he acknowledged his utter reliance on God for the gifts and the grace he needed to be of good service to his people. But Moses' leadership was also dependent upon the relationships he shared with his contemporaries. For that reason, the ancient authors have featured him praying to God in the people's presence and with their support. They literally held him up, thus affirming the truth that no one can lead unless others are willing to be led. Through their cooperative action of supporting Moses in his praver, the people also acknowledged that their ultimate leader was and would always be God.

The second letter to Timothy reminds the praying assembly of the living gift of the sacred scriptures. An ongoing source of inspiration, the word of God continues to bring a powerful, salient message to the ever-evolving and ever-shifting circumstances that characterize the human condition. Authentic reverence is always needed when we approach the word of God. We should take care when listening to the word that we do not distort or twist its message to fit our own agenda. Attentive listening also means that we hear what is there and do not ignore any part of the word or listen selectively, taking what is pleasant and leaving behind what is uncomfortable or challenging. Although the word is a gift that requires careful unwrapping, it needs no embellishment. For all these reasons, it is right, fitting and ever so just that we are frequently reminded of the gift that is ours in the word.

A third lesson is set before us today in the example of a feisty little woman who dared to confront injustice and the abuse of power so that her voice can be heard. With no one to speak for her and no rights to lean upon (as was the case for many widows in the ancient Jewish world), she dug deep into herself, and there she found the God-given perseverance she needed to continue to plead her case. Through the centuries, this unnamed woman has been held out to believers as an impetus to pray without ceasing or losing heart. While this is certainly part of the lesson she continues to teach, it is also clear that the Lucan Jesus presented this woman as one who raised her voice to demand justice and who did not cease until justice was served. Persistence in prayer can fuel the perseverance we need in order to keep pleading the causes of the poor, the victims of injustice, the marginalized. How wise of Jesus to choose one of the least ones of God to teach the hard lessons of perseverance. Because he chose a widow whose social status had nothing to recommend her or gain her an audience, we cannot excuse ourselves as being too unimportant or too ineffectual to act. Because her political situation offered no support or defense, we cannot claim that our resources are too few or too weak to make any impact. Because her legal circumstances offered her no alternative save to speak and act for herself, we cannot hide behind an excuse of powerlessness. Moreover, the fact that she was undeterred, despite seemingly insurmountable odds against her, reminds us that quitting is not an option we should allow ourselves to consider. With Moses, Timothy and the unnamed woman who wore down an unjust judge, we are called and challenged to pray for and to cooperate with the daily grace that enables us to keep on going.
