Mindsets in Prayer



Today's Lucan reading reinforces the concept of biblical faith revolving around relationships. Scholars remind us that the historical Jesus constantly used parables in his ministry because he was interested not in conveying new information to his

listeners, but in helping them to retool their minds, to completely transform the way they processed all information. In many ways, a parable tells us, "You can't get there from here." In other words, "Because of the way you've been approaching reality you'll never experience God present and working in your lives. You've got to acquire a new mindset to experience God's kingdom."

In today's case of the Pharisee and the tax collector, to the amazement of many in Jesus' audience, only the latter has the frame of mind God wishes us to have. The sinner alone "returns home justified," meaning, having done what God wishes us to do. The Pharisee, concerned only with keeping rules and regulations, simply doesn't relate to Yahweh as Yahweh expects him to relate. Though he can boast, "I am not like the rest of humanity — greedy, dishonest, adulterous — or even like this tax collector," his faith isn't biblical faith. His claim on justification revolves around fasting twice a week and paying tithes on his whole income; things every good Jew should do, not because they're two of the Mosaic laws, but because that's what someone does who relates to a loving, giving God.

In many ways, the tax collector is religiously trapped. Working for the Roman army of occupation, he's not only a traitor to his country and his people; he's sinning in ways that leave him little wiggle room. He lives and works in a sinful environment. There's a reason he "stood off at a distance." As a public sinner, he's not even allowed to enter the temple proper. He's probably forced to pray in the Court of the Gentiles, an area reserved for non-Jews.

Like all good parables, this one completely destroys the listeners' presuppositions. The Pharisee - the super law-abiding Jew — is criticized for doing what most Jews believe is God's will: while the tax collector - the sinner - is put forth as someone to be imitated. I have no doubt many in Jesus' audience came home that evening and declared, "Now I'm really confused." The tax collector had only his humility and trust in God. In the end, that counted for everything. He was in right relationship with God because he wanted and needed God to be God. He couldn't save himself and he knew better than to try. Franciscan Fr. Richard Rohr could well be describing the tax collector's stance when he says, "To finally surrender ourselves to healing we have to have three spaces opened up within us - and all at the same time: our opinionated head, our closed-down heart, and our defensive and defended body" (Breathing Under Water, St. Anthony Messenger Press, 2011).

The example of the tax collector is there for all of us, especially the "religious ones" with our selfcongratulatory attitudes. Perhaps if we can learn to say the words with the tax collector, we can begin to pick up on his graced mindset as well. Let us pray: "O God, be merciful to me, a sinner."

For the grace of humility, that we may come before God honestly, surrendering our pride and recognizing our dependence on God's love and mercy...**We pray...**
