

THE GOOD SHEPHERD



In the relatively brief time that Jesus spent with those he called to share in his ministry, he taught them many things. By word and by example, he taught them about God's love for them and for all peoples. He taught them that all human beings have unique value and God-given talents, all of which are intended for the

good and well-being of others. Through various parables, he invited them to approach God for forgiveness and to be sure that they would not be rebuffed, for God, like a loving parent, never ceases to love the child. Through countless acts of mercy and loving kindness, Jesus passed on to his disciples the realization that they were to be similarly compassionate toward all others. Again and again, he challenged those erroneous ideas that judged sinners and the sick, the marginalized and the disenfranchised as outcasts, unloved by God and not worthy of the time and effort of others. Much to the surprise and dismay of his contemporaries, Jesus continually insisted that the poor and the wretched were the chosen ones of God and should be, therefore, the primary focus of his disciples' service. In their service of God's poor ones, the disciples of Jesus were also taught that salvation was not a reward merited by those who scrupulously interpreted and observed the law; rather, Jesus made it clear that salvation is God's gracious gift to sinners who, for their part, are to welcome it with humble, grateful love.

In addition to all these lessons, Jesus was also concerned that those who followed him would learn how they would be called upon to lead others. As it

became clearer and clearer to him that his time with his own would be cut short, he opened his heart and mind to them and allowed them to see how he perceived his role and how they might perceive theirs. Some of Jesus' most poignant convictions concerning his leadership are revealed in today's sacred texts.

In the Gospel, Jesus aspired to lead as a shepherd leads his flock. Unlike a monarch who may not know his subjects except in terms of demographics and expected revenues ... unlike a military ruler whose armies consist of nameless and faceless throngs who are valued for their prowess and strategies ... unlike the religious rulers of his day who had little vested interest in the welfare of the general population, Jesus led like a shepherd. In that capacity, he had a personal relationship with every sheep; they knew his voice and followed only his commands. He knew their names and called each of them to follow where he would lead. In the very personal and lifelong relationship that bound shepherd to sheep, Jesus found the imagery to explain the extent of his love and caring. He had not come like a hired hand who values his own safety. He had not come like a thief or a marauder who would use the sheep for her own monetary gain. Rather, Jesus came like the shepherd whose loving efforts for the sheep are celebrated in the responsorial psalm. In his presence, sinners find repose and refreshment, safety and sustenance and, most of all, a personal relationship where each is known intimately to the other. That relationship Jesus shared with his own did not allow any constraint. His love and caring were so authentic and so enduring that he was willing to suffer for them — even to the point of dying on the cross so that the straying sheep might be saved (1 Peter, second reading). As their Shepherd, he had died for them; in that capacity. he also rose to life and graced his followers with his aptitude for leadership.

During the Easter season, the sacred texts show us that aptitude reflected in the words and works of Peter, the Eleven and those other early leaders called to shepherd Jesus' flock. In today's first reading, Peter's speech, as composed by Luke, hints of no judgmental anger or any desire for vengeance. Rather, Peter as shepherd in Jesus' stead, gently but firmly appealed to the Jewish community to accept Jesus and the gift of salvation. His pasturing, in Jesus' name, lifted him above his fears and above any resentment he may have had so that he could welcome all into the sheepfold of Jesus. Those who lead God's people today are also challenged to know their charges intimately, to call them by name, to care for their needs, to keep them from harm. In all we do and say, we are to bear witness to the Shepherd we call Good.


