A CHRISTMAS REFLECTION Isa 52:7-10 Ps 98 Heb 1:1-6 John 1:1-18

CHRISTMAS HOPE



Some communities celebrate in a very poignant way the mystery of the coming of our God into flesh and blood and time and space in order to save humankind from sin and death. The same wood they use to fashion the crèche at Christmas is taken apart and restructured into a cross at Easter. From the

crèche, believers journey through the liturgical year until they come full circle to the cross at Holy Week and Easter; this is the journey that Jesus made, and this is the journey that has led us home to God. There is no false sentimentality here. Whoever sees the infant in the Christmas crèche also looks upon the crucified adult Christ. Christmas and this journey from crèche to cross belong to those who recognize the real presence of God in their lives and in the world. Such people understand that God is really present — not simply once upon a long time ago and far away, but here and now. This ever-present God inhabits humble hearts and knows the turmoil and struggles within. This present God supports every human effort at being transparent so that something of God's goodness shines in every believer to offer hope to others.

Isaiah had this kind of transparency. He urged his fellow exiles to raise their heads above their present difficulties and look with hope to the God who was by their side through it all. His words of comfort and encouragement reach out to us across the centuries and the generations, calling each of us out of those places of exile where we hide from God, from life and from one another. We are here, but not completely; we are engaged with others, but not without reservation. Have pretended to be talking on your cell phone so we can avoid personal interaction with others? We sometimes want to disengage so we might not risk being hurt or used or worn out, but the reality of today's feast demands otherwise. Today, as every day, our God is calling and texting and communicating, in every way possible, the assurance that God is with us!

This assurance empowers us to be present to others as God is to us, in crèche-moments as well as in cross-moments.

In the second reading on Christmas morning, the author of Hebrews explores the wonder of God's presence with us, tracing God's ongoing conversation with humankind to its beginnings. In times past, the divine presence was made known through the prophets. In the fullness of time, God became present and began to speak the language of human existence in Jesus. He communicated God's compassion and forgiveness not in bolts of lightning or claps of thunder, not in fire or in earthquake, but with a human voice.

In today's Gospel, the fourth evangelist describes the wonder of this reality with unmatched eloquence. The Word who is God became flesh to live among us. On one of the last Christmases of his life, Oscar Romero, the martyred archbishop of San Salvador, shared with his people his appreciation of God's presence in the world: "Today, we recall that God's reign is now, in this world, and that Christ has inaugurated the fullness of time. Christ's birth attests that God is now marching with us in history - that we do not go alone, and that our aspiration for peace, for justice, for a reign of divine law, for something holy, is far from earth's realities. Nevertheless, we can hope for all these things, not because we human beings are able to construct that realm of holiness which God's holy words proclaim but because the builder of a reign of justice, of love and peace is already in the midst of us" (The Violence of Love, The Plough Pub. Co., Farmington, Pa.: 1988). It is as if Romero is speaking to the world today and brings to us the reminder that God is with us. Emmanuel is here. If each of us could truly grasp this inscrutable mystery and live our lives accordingly, this world could not help but be transformed. This process of transformation began in the crèche and climaxed on the cross. May the joy, hope, peace and love that mark this Christmas Feast fill each one of us and allow us to share the gifts of this day in all that we do and all that we say. Happy Christmas!

May the blessings of this Holy Season be with you always.



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
