LET ME SEE!



The story is told of a poor farmer whose horse was killed by a passing His neighbours truck. lamented his loss, but he said, "We'll see." The driver of the truck settled generously with the farmer. and with the money he bought a much better, vounger

horse. His neighbours rejoiced at his good fortune, but the farmer said, "We'll see." Sometime later his son took the horse out for a night ride, fell off and broke his leg. The farmer's neighbours consoled him, but he said, "We'll see." The following week, the country went to war and all the young men were called up to serve, but the farmer's son was excused because of his injury. The lesson of this folk tale is that events can have both good and bad effects. It all depends. And one seemingly unlucky outcome can result in something good, or visa versa. This can also be the challenge for us when we pray. Do we know what is truly good for us? If we always got what we asked for, would this really be for our long term benefit? Every outcome has its own costs and benefits. The person who succeeds runs the risk of pride, which is his downfall, while the person who fails learns patience and humility and this enables her to succeed. The handsome boy or beautiful girl win automatic approval and get an automatic pass while the ordinary child must work hard to achieve a goal. Character is shaped by both opportunity and adversity. Only in hindsight do we know what was really good or bad for us. In today's Gospel, Jesus asks the blind man a question we might all ask ourselves, "What do you want God to do for you?" Just what do you want? What is the most important prayer you could pray or should be praying for even now? The blind beggar sat every day along the side of the main thoroughfare, wrapped in his cloak, listening to passing crowds and crying out for alms. He was a familiar fixture as the town blind

man and, perhaps, earns enough income to survive. All this changed the day Jesus came to town. Something moved the man to cry out, "Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me." He addressed Jesus with a messianic title, as Savior, and despite the rebuke from the crowd to be quiet, he cried out all the louder. Jesus called him over and then the crowd was eager to present him to Jesus, who asked, "What do you want me to do for you?" It is a blank check, wide open, sky's the limit opportunity. The man's reply was immediate and specific. "Master, I want to see." A blessing or a challenge? We'll see. At the end of the day, he was no longer a blind beggar but a sighted man with no source of income. He was no longer on the sidelines, but on the road and following Jesus to Jerusalem, where the Master's fate would be shared by his followers. Surely a blessing, but not without cost.

Jesus is asking us every day what we want? Grace surrounds our every decision and action. The challenge of the Christian life is to pray boldly and specifically for what we think we want and need. Through hardship and good fortune, setback and advantage, one thing is certain: God, who knows and loves us, will be with us every step of the way. The journey will join our wants to God's will, stage by stage, until what God wants for us is exactly what we need most and want for ourselves. Bartimaeus, named in the Gospels, is remembered these 2,000 years later for his courage to ask to see. Though he disappears from the story, his witness to every generation of believers, including ours, is this: Don't be afraid to pray his prayer. Ask to see. Enter reality with clarity and insight; know life's priorities and values; always go forward. God's life will be a lamp unto your feet, one step at a time, guiding you through every trial and storm to glory.


