Deuteronomy 6:2-6 Psalm 18
Hebrews 7:23-28 Mark 12:28b-34
THE GREAT LAW OF LOVE



Today's readings are interconnected and reveal the fullness of God's message to all of his people. Perhaps an example of what is revealed would lead us to a deeper understanding of God's call. November 3rd is the Feast Day for St. Martin de Porres, the illegitimate child of Anna

Valezquez, a formerly enslaved Afro-Panamanian woman, and a Spanish nobleman who abandoned his family following the birth of Martin's younger sister. Martin is the first person of African descent from the Americas to be declared a saint. His life was devoted to service and no task was too menial. St. Martín, a porter, barber-surgeon, healer and friend of the poor was never ordained. He was a brother in the Dominican order whose life preached in a way that few others have - or might even wish to do. He understood that love of God implies love of everyone and everything that God loves. He understood that love of Christ implies giving oneself unreservedly for God's beloved. He rankled more than one of his brothers and contemporaries with his freedom to put the law of love above every religious practice and restriction. He offered a frightening example because, like Jesus, he went where the Spirit led him rather than confine himself to "how it should be done." He made the word of God as real and effective as a two-edged sword. Once, he encountered a sore-ridden beggar and brought him to his own bed in the monastery. When the superior reprimanded him for allowing a dirty, contagious stranger into the cloister, Martín replied that he could easily wash sheets, but not the guilt of ignoring the poor. Disregarding the difference between his rank as a brother and that of his superior, Martín replied, "Compassion, dear brother, is preferable to cleanliness." Martín might be a good interpreter of today's Liturgy of the Word for us.

In Jesus' day, it was not unusual for a recognized teacher to be asked questions about the law. Such question-and-answer sessions were a favorite pastime of scribes who were experts at interpreting and applying the law's many directions. Although the scribe in this Marcan Gospel asked Jesus which law ranked first, Jesus responded with a pair of laws that he declared to be on a par with one another. By citing the Sh'ma (first reading), Jesus acknowledged the importance of this centuries-old Jewish tradition. Devout Jews took the words of the Deuteronomist (6:8-9) to heart and wore the words of the Sh'ma in phylacteries attached to their wrists and foreheads. Each Jewish home had a mezuzah inscribed with the Sh'ma and mounted on its doorframe so that when family members came and went, they could touch the mezuzah to remind them to love the God who loved them. No one would have argued with Jesus' response to the scribe. But few probably expected Jesus to pair the love of neighbour with the love of God. He was not, however, the first to do so. Jesus' teaching is unique, though, in that he paired what his contemporaries would have regarded as a "heavy" law (love of God) with what was regarded as a "light" or lesser law (love of neighbour). Moreover, Jesus insisted that these laws are equal and interdependent. Later, in the 80s, when Luke offered his version of the Gospel, the concept of "neighbour" was expanded to include all people without distinction. To his credit, the scribe who auestioned Jesus recognized the wisdom in his words and, with a nod to the best traditions of the prophets, he admitted that Jesus' call to love God and neighbour was worth more than any sacrificial offering. He grasped the truth that the mercy, compassion and care that human beings extend to one another speak more truly of love than even the most extravagant and meticulously performed cultic ritual. Jesus praised the scribe's insight and declared him to be "not far from the kingdom of God" (v. 34). Jesus' observation reaches out to ask us where we stand today. Are we content with fulfilling our weekly obligation to gather and worship God and celebrate God's goodness? Or will we carry over that celebration into the rest of the week by loving and caring for all those whom God will send our way? Worship of God and love of God are made real in the love of our neighbour. To the Jew, the law is God's greatest gift to humankind; it reveals a way of relating to God. What is at issue in this Gospel is not the validity of the law but the basic principle from which the law is derived — love. Love of God and love of neighbour fulfill the law.

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
