January 12<sup>th</sup> is the feast day of SAINT MARGUERITE BOURGEOYS (1620-1700). first female Canadian Saint and founder of the first non-cloistered congregation of women in Canada, the Congregation of Notre-Dame, Montreal. Saint Marguerite teaches that "God is everywhere and is present in all creation". (584) Libby Osgood, ND, is a religious sister, professor of sustainable design engineering and author of: Ecological Saints: Adopting a Green Gaze of the Life and Writings of Saint Marguerite Bourgeovs. Osgood applies six indicators for determining the classification of "ecological saint". Other saints she presents as ecological include Saint Francis of Assisi, St. Kateri Tekakwitha, St. Therese of Lisieux, St. Hildegarde von Bingen and numerous Celtic saints. Osgood argues that saints can be "sought as spiritual guides to illuminate a path, provide hope and inspire action" (569). Ecological saints, she argues, "become our inspiration and guides to be more attuned to the needs of the planet, working toward a hope-filled future." (570) Osgood writes that by "reexamining well-loved saints through an ecological lens, devotees may be inspired to become more environmentally aware and motivated toward action. # BAPTISM OF THE LORD "You are my Son, the Beloved; With you I am well pleased." Lk 3:22



This Sunday marks the formal end of our Christmas season and the Baptism of the Lord ushers in the public life of Jesus. The final line of this Gospel reveals an intimate moment between Father

and Son as God addresses Jesus directly. Who would not want to hear these words over and over? The beloved of God! It is candy and circuses and ice cream and all your favourite things wrapped in the best Christmas paper with the biggest bow ever. God has settled upon you as his special one. Everything will be fine. Except that is not the real meaning of Beloved. There is another side of being loved by God and it is one that we do not readily accept in our own lives – God's toleration of pain and suffering in his

beloved. We don't think that makes a lot of sense. We go to great lengths to keep our loved ones from suffering - why does God allow it? Jesus' suffering begins immediately after he hears God's consoling voice at baptism. He goes to the desert to ponder what he has heard. He receives huge, slick temptations that beckon him to employ his newly discovered status as beloved in order to build up earthly power and honour. Directly and deeply contrary to his mission, of course, but God lets it happen. Why? God is like a parent watching his teenager's growing pains. Help all you can, but definitely do not try to stop the growing. Suffering and temptation confront us always, and they give us the opportunity to grow, to broaden our scope, to understand better what love is, to see that love does not mean God taking charge and making everything alright. Rather, it means God staying with the beloved, continuing to love and admire that special one, no matter what is grinding him down. So maybe this is what Jesus actually heard at the Jordan. Receive love that never runs away, never lets go, even in the desert, even on the cross.

## A Prayer of Love, Joy and Peace for 2025.

My spirit hungers for your love, O Divine Maker of hearts, for the taste of your joy and the aroma of your peace. May this time of prayer fill me with the whisper of your presence and let me feel the touch of your hand upon my heart. How I long for the depths of your love, to know your quiet constancy, the feast of your friendship that feeds me without end. Oh, how my soul longs for you. You elude all names we give you and dwell beyond the grasp of brilliant minds. Your essence pulses within every atom yet extends beyond the far frontiers of space, unscanned by the strongest telescopes. Awaken me to your presence, now, this moment, in my heart. Amen.
