
rebuild their lives, and people with special needs striving for dignity and acceptance. Thank you for living the Gospel through your compassion.

SCRUTINIES

The parish of St. Anselm will welcome several new members to the Sacraments of Initiation at the Easter Vigil this year. In preparation for Baptism, Confirmation and First Eucharist, these elect will celebrate the 3 Scrutinies during the 3rd, 4th and 5th Sundays of Lent. The readings for these 3 weekend celebrations will be taken from the A cycle readings provided in your missalettes. The Scrutinies are rites for self-searching and repentance and have above all a spiritual purpose. They are celebrated in order to deliver the elect from the power of sin and Satan, to protect them against temptation and to give them strength in Christ, who is the way, the truth and the life. Let us continue to pray with the elect as they take these final steps in their preparation to join us at the table of the Word and the table of the Eucharist.

Gen 15:5-12, 17-18 Psalm 27
Phil 3:17-4:1 Luke 9:28-36
I am your God and you are my people...



The readings this Sunday talk about God's "covenant" with human beings, offered not once but many times. It is an agreement that we have sometimes kept. The great covenant offer fits into just eleven words. "I will be your God and

you will be my people." God promises to love us greatly and in return we pledge to love God above all things. Originally, our first parents had such a relationship with God in the Garden of Eden. But God had given free will to them and he watched with anguish as this same free will rejected his love. God toiled to re-establish the covenant agreement. After many such refusals, he singled out a paltry old nomadic man named Abram and said to him, "Look toward heaven and count the stars, if you are able to count them." Then He said to him, "So shall your descendants be." What is Abram's reaction? Abram put his faith in the Lord. God credited it to him as an act of "righteousness." God credits Abram with desiring to receive the offered love ("I will be your God") and in return putting his faith in the Lord ("you will be my people"). Abram was ratifying the agreement. An ancient sacrificial cult then took place. As the sun was about to set, a trance fell upon Abram and a deep, terrifying darkness enveloped him. Fire appeared among the animals that Abram had slain. God spoke, promising a homeland—the "promised land"—to Abram and his descendants. This offer symbolized God's half of the covenant. The other half was up to Abram and his wife Sara, because covenants are two-way relationships. The two had a son at last in their extreme old age. Good! But the son's descendants sometimes kept the covenant and sometimes did not. As time went by, the famous covenant was forgotten and ignored.

When the time was right, God came up with a brilliant solution. Instead of offering love just from on high, he would himself take shape on earth as Jesus—the Messiah, the Christ. Jesus was to actually become the very love that God had offered for so many centuries. And since he was completely a human being, he was also at the same time the people's loving response. As God and man he was able to fulfill both halves of the covenant! Transfiguration in Sunday's Gospel seems modeled on a covenant ceremony! Jesus is transformed, his clothes dazzling as fire-a counterpart to the fire in the First Reading. Just as with Abram, terrifying darkness closes in. Within the darkness, God's voice repeats the premise of the new covenant. "This is my Son, my Chosen; listen to him." In the cross and resurrection the covenant is finally fulfilled on both sides, the Godly one and the human one. We no longer have to offer sacrifices to make good on a covenant. We have only to let ourselves be joined to Jesus who has accomplished our covenantal response to the Father. How do we do this? In Baptism we began it. We continue in each Mass, each communion we receive. We say "Amen" to the covenant so many times broken but now established in Jesus forever as the "new and everlasting covenant." Today's liturgy is about restoring our sight so that we can "see the bounty of the Lord in the land of the living." The disciples saw "the bounty of the Lord" on the mountaintop. They witnessed the dazzling glory of Jesus shining in the company of Moses and Elijah, the glory of the fulfillment of the law and the prophets. Abraham had also stood in the presence of the Lord, and he had been overwhelmed by a terrifying darkness pierced by the bright light of a smoking brazier and a flaming torch. The road from Abraham's encounter with God to the disciples' encounter with God was a long one. Lent is an acting-out of the long road from the covenant to its fulfillment. It is our public proclamation that we are a people who "eagerly await the coming of our saviour, the Lord Jesus Christ." We recognize that "we have our citizenship in heaven," but in the meantime we exercise our citizenship on earth for the coming of the kingdom of God. We purge ourselves of our selfreliance, our thirst for power, and our preoccupation with self-interest, sacrificing and praying that God might "deliver Israel from all her distress."
