** Were you given extra lids by accident? There always seems to be a shortage of lids - they are very thin and often stick to one another. You may return extra lids to us at any casserole drop-off or on weekends at Mass. Our parish casserole ministry is important year-round, but even more so during the cold winter months when the city's most vulnerable seek shelter and a warm meal. Each casserole prepared by parishioners feeds TEN hungry individuals who would otherwise have nothing to sustain themselves. This ministry is open to everyone, including high school students seeking volunteer hours. The recipe is provided and is a simple one with just six common ingredients. Pans and lids are also provided and your commitment would be just one casserole every other month. In doing so, you would be feeding 60 people throughout the course of a year! Thank you to our casserole chefs for your dedication and commitment to feeding the hungry.

THE BAPTISM OF THE LORD

Isa 42:1-4, 6-7 Psalm 29

Acts 10:34-38 Matt 3:13-17

“God’s Love Song”



Baptism is a celebration of love, a visible sign of God's unending embrace. Today's Gospel reading from Matthew recalls Jesus' baptism. There is no mistaking God's love here; it bursts forth through the heavens, and a voice proclaims, “This is my Son, the Beloved.” Beloved. The word

evokes a myriad of deep human emotions. We yearn to have a beloved and to be a beloved. So often this experience seems just beyond our grasp. Today's readings have come to teach us that our yearning has been fulfilled. Do we have the courage to claim our heritage as beloved sons and daughters of God in Christ? Today's Gospel passage is often taken as a confirmation of Jesus' divinity. It is this, indeed, but also an affirmation that his divinity and his humanity are one. At his baptism, his first public appearance, Jesus immerses himself in humanity as he goes down into the waters of the Jordan. He does not need the baptism of repentance that John offers but he insists that it be done. In doing this, he underlines his "yes" to our human condition. He is one of us, the suffering servant chosen by God to renew the covenant with us. Isaiah presents this beautifully in the first reading as the answer to our longing: "Here is my servant whom I uphold, my chosen, in whom my soul delights; I have put my spirit upon him;" (Isa 42:1).

God speaks from heaven this day because Jesus needs to hear the voice of his Father. Jesus, though divine, is on a human journey. His mother has told him the extraordinary events surrounding his birth; he has read and reread the scriptures and at times may have recognized himself as the One. Today, he steps out into public ministry, but he does not have the next three years scripted before him. He is like us in all things but sin — he enters into the water fully human. He rises up to hear the words of his Father rejoicing in him. A baptism is always a love story. Jesus' baptism is no different, yet this love story encompasses all of creation. If the love story includes us ... if we are part of the dance of creation ... then why do we so often feel disconnected from the whole? If God loves us so deeply, then why do we feel so lonely so much of the time? I am reminded of *The Scarecrow's Dance*, a poignant children's story written by Jane Yolen. In this tale the scarecrow is feeling much like us as he stands alone in his field. One day a wild wind sets him free from his post. He dances and spins with joy through the air. As he glides by a bedroom window, he hears a child's voice thanking God for the scarecrow who protects the crops. Amazed and delighted to be so deeply regarded, the scarecrow races back to his post and finds that it fits his soul just right. Like the scarecrow, we all need to know that God is well pleased with us. How do we reach this place of knowing? A voice affirmed Jesus as "my Son, the Beloved." Linguists tell us that the Greek words

"my Son" can be understood as equivalent to the Hebrew "my Servant." God's favour was upon Jesus, the Son, as he began to accomplish the divine will as Servant. Empowered by the Spirit, the Son and Servant Jesus began at his baptism the work that we, his baptized sisters and brothers, are privileged to continue, making known the loving and salvific plan of God for all of humankind. As Christians, we are not called simply to worship and believe in Jesus Christ but to share in his intimate relationship with God. We too are invited to seek to do God's will and to hear the response "You are my beloved and in you I am well pleased". This is what we celebrate in remembering Jesus' baptism and our own. ***For each one of us...for God's own grace, that we might continue to live out our baptismal promises and grow to be the holy men and women God intends us to be...We pray...***

Did You Know...

The Mass, also known as The Lord's Supper or Eucharist, is composed of two very important parts – The Liturgy of the Word and The Liturgy of the Eucharist. These two parts can also be broken down further into The Gathering Rite, the Liturgy of the Word, The Liturgy of the Eucharist and The Farewell. All the parts work together to offer praise and glory to God. Believers understand that God is present in both the liturgy of the Word and the Liturgy of the Eucharist. When we begin to break open the parts of the Mass, we realize that the invitation to celebrate that is offered comes from God. Over the next few weeks, we will explore what that means.
